During the workshops, we will analyze situations of violence likely to awaken traumas.

Workshop content

This workshop aims to support PhDs, teaching assistants and professors in collectively reflecting on the notion of consent so they can better apply it in the context of their research and teaching activities. It will also give tips on how to react as bystander, including as a confident to a victim of sexual violence.

Main objective: to promote a culture of consent

At the end of the course, participants will be able to :

- Define consent in social interactions (relationships between colleagues, professor-student relationships)
- Deconstruct preconceived ideas about consent and sexual violence
- Analyse scenarios to identify and recognise situations of violence
- Know how to react as a bystander

Our facilitators

Juliette Sanchez-Lambert

A trainer, facilitator and consultant on harassment prevention for the public and private sector, Juliette is the co-author of "It's Not That Grey", a <u>practical guide on the "grey zone"</u> <u>of sexual harassment</u> which earned her the nomination, in 2019, as one of the 50 women of the year in Belgium by the RTBF. Her other areas of expertise are human rights, LGBTQI+ rights and gender equality. She holds a master's degree in international law from the University of Strasbourg and a master's degree in gender studies from the University of Utrecht and the University of Hull.



Sophie Loup

Sophie is one of the founders of the Not the Only One project, established in 2018 in the UK, which aims to provide support, coaching and training within universities for victims of sexual violence. In particular, Sophie facilitates victim-only workshops. A graduate in economics and sociology from the London School of Economics, she has worked for several years in the field of children's rights and education, both nationally and internationally. Having worked for a patient organization, she is particularly interested in the link between chronic illness and trauma. She counsels students on these topics in order to improve their quality of life on a daily basis.
